





Meeting Announcement!

The HCC meeting on March 8 will feature Jerry Hopkins, Region 4 Director of TP&W. Region 4 includes 12 locations, among them Village Creek, Sheldon Lake and Lake Texana. Mr. Hopkins has worked in the TP&W system for 23 years. He will discuss the failure of appropriations to match rising expenses. He will share how the shortfall has been handled over the past 5 years, what is being done to mitigate the shortfall, and the importance of state parks to local economies.

The meeting begins at 7 PM at Bayland Park, 6400 Bissonnet, in the community building. The park is located just west of Hillcroft on Bissonnet.







SUMMARY OF TEXAS RIVER PROTECTION ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEETING

March 5, 2006 at Pecan Park Retreat, Martindale, Texas By Anne Olden

- Roy Edwards, landowner on the San Bernard River, discussed the silting over of the mouth of the River and efforts to reopen it. The local economy and wildlife sanctuaries have been adversely affected. He asked for TRPA support to communicate the need for the river to flow. - Ed Lowe, TRPA Board Member and President of Friends of the Brazos River, said the Brazos River Authority has applied to TCEQ for all the unappropriated water rights in the river. Ed's group is contesting this application and working to inform riverside landowners and others about the value of maintaining water in the river. There is a cleanup on the river near Glen Rose on April 1. For more information about FBR, go to the TRPA website, txrivers.org and click on the FBR link.
- Steve Daniel, TRPA Board Member and driving force behind the development of Hidalgo Falls, has been approached by a Brazos County Commissioner regarding the commissioner's desire to establish a canoe launch/park on the Brazos River. The commissioner needs ideas for funding this area. Several resources were suggested.
- Jim Hannah, from Bandera, discussed the need for instream and groundwater flow studies of the Medina River watershed. It is important to know water availability in the rapidly developing area north and west of San Antonio. TRPA agreed to write a letter supporting a study by the USGS.
- Michael Van Winkle, TRPA Board Member and longtime Kerrville resident, gave the background of a rock crushing operation recently started in the community of Center Point on the bank of the Guadalupe River. This is a popular area for HCC paddlers. TRPA, on behalf of several local landowners, has requested a contested hearing on a TCEQ air quality permit for the business. There may be negative impacts on the river from this as well.
- Tom Goynes, TRPA President, said the Rio Vista rapids project to replace the deteriorating dam, is on track.



Obedience lessons for your canoe, tandem or solo, that's what La Louisiane Canoe Symposium is all about. La Lou to most, is an open canoe symposium for any level, beginner to advanced. It usually consists of about 12 to 14 instructors and 40 to 50 students and is held in Louisiana at the beginning of April at a private group camp which features bunkhouses, a dining hall, and private pond. La Lou 06 will be on March 31, April 1 & 2, 2006. Unfortunately camping is not allowed but the bunkhouse rate is the same as a campsite in the nearby State Park and camping gear does not have to be hauled across the country. The food issue is conveniently handled at an on site mess hall and anyone who has attended will testify that the food is very good. Full breakfasts, and real Cajun cuisine are featured (that means not overly hot as some seem to believe). We usually have a music jam around a campfire ring on Sat. night.

We have a lot of fun, but the main emphasis is instruction.

Orientation, class assignments, and introductions are held after Friday supper. The classes are 3 hours each on Sat. morning, again that afternoon, and Sunday morning. We meet great paddlers from all over the world, eat well, and learn a lot. The first Freestyle Development Workshop was held on this site in 1992, so 2006 will make 14 years of instruction there.

Pearland's Mayor Tom Reid was at the meeting. He heard a Council member mention that their next stumbling block is gathering monetary resources to become a 501(c)3

organization.

Reid promptly waved a \$100 bill in the air, donated the money to the cause, and then challenged board members to each come up with \$13.50 for their tax-exempt status. Representatives from the Galveston Bay Estuary Program (GBEP), the Bayou Preservation Association, and the Houston Canoe Club, were on hand to spread the word about their upcoming events.

"Galveston Bay was designated an estuary of national significance in 1989," said one GBEP representative. "We want folks to be involved in the future of Galveston Bay, but we like to keep the kids busy doing fun things. So we're offering Community Open Houses, from 1-5 p.m., with free refreshments, free give-aways for kids and adults, and door prize drawings."

"We've been working on freshwater management, shoreline management, water quality projects, and public outreach," another ecotourism advocate said. "We'll be asking corporations, civic groups, churches, and Rotaries, to get involved and have a say in the future of Galveston Bay."

Eric "Eyes on the Bayou" Ruckstuhl, from the Bayou Preservation Association, made a stunning presentation of his canoe rides on the bayous and creeks in the area. Ruckstuhl's canoed a large part of Clear Creek and has an online column called "Canoeing Houston's Bayous and Creeks."

Ruckstuhl called Clear Creek "one of the most beautiful wild streams in the Houston area," saying "It has been compared to streams in the rain forest and parts of it also resemble the Big Thicket."

Ruckstuhl went on to say that most of the mid-section of the creek, including a paddle trail from 1776 Memorial Park, to Oxnard Park, a 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ mile trip, is a great experience and has large pines and hardwoods along the banks.



Chocolate Bayou an Easy Run by Anne Olden



February 4 was a perfect day to paddle. The morning was cool and clear, and the day warmed gently. The parking area for the put-in is just off State Rd. 35, about ¹/₄ mile below FM 2917 in Brazoria County. There is no sign, except that you have just crossed the Bayou before you turn left (assuming you're heading south). Dave Ramsey, trip co-coordinator, described it well in saying that there are two driveways to the put-in. This location is a good day trip for those

living in the south and southeast of Houston.



Fourteen paddlers, including eleven HCC members and three guests, met about 9 a.m. Dave very generously brought equipment for people who did not have their own. Laura Faulkenberry, Wendy MacArthur and Michael Turner used Dave's kayaks. Mitch and Meredith Catrett brought their new Wenonah tandem; Lorin and Nadira Martin brought small 25 pound sea kayaks – a joy to lift. James Keen, a guest, brought an old Wenonah Solo Plus that he'd bought on e-bay and

repaired. New member Ed Mayo paddled a beautiful sea kayak that he'd made from a kit. Mark Andrus paddled his Caption solo. Rheda Boardman borrowed one of Dave's kayaks; Rheda is a Red Cross instructor and offered paddling advice. John and I tandemed our Legend. Dave zipped around in his whitewater kayak, offering tips to the new paddlers.



We started about 10:15, after Dave gave a safety talk and explained the portage about 3 ½ miles into the 6 mile trip. There were a few minor strainers, but no flow at this low level. About noon we stopped at the dam, a concrete barrier which blocks saltwater from Galveston Bay from coming up the Bayou and contaminating this water, which is used for irrigation. The saltwater barrier should always be portaged, never run. Although the water was well below the dam,

there were still muddy/slippery places on top, so we disembarked gingerly. This was snack time, a chance to stretch legs.

Below the dam the banks are more heavily wooded. The take-out is in a park near Liverpool. We helped each other out of our boats and lunched on the picnic tables under the trees. Ed Mayo shared beautiful 81/2 x 11 photos he'd taken at Armand Bayou, Caddo Lake, and Buffalo National River. We hope he'll show us some of them at a meeting. There is no drinking water available on the trip, and there are no restrooms. Special thanks to Dave for bringing boats and equipment.



Once i convinced him to get in the other boat with his big bro, we set off to gather trash in the flat water area along Pecan Park and a little further upstream.



Sunday morning, we played some more in the river, paddled some, swam some, and generally had a great time. Bob Foote was there teaching a class. Lonnie wants a paddle next time... and both boys want to go through the rapids. Maybe they're ready for that, maybe not... but I'M not ready for them to go through the rapids yet! Ii think we may have a couple of up and coming little kayaker's on our hands! Are we ready for this? I sure hope so! I never got any pictures of anything, but Bob Foote did take a picture of the boys in their little white kayak.

Then we packed up to go to a friend's birthday party at Chuck E. Cheese's.... When we got there, Lonnie looked around at the madness in there, looked up at me, and said, "Go back to the campsite? Go back to the river?"
